The San Francisco Bay Regional Water Quality Control Board and the California Department of Fish and Wildlife have approved a mitigation settlement allowing Clover Flat Landfill, Inc. to satisfy a portion of its obligations by providing \$954,000 to Napa RCD. These funds will support the Huichica Creek Riparian and Salt Marsh Restoration Project and, when combined with a \$1 million Measure AA grant award, will fully fund the design and environmental compliance phase of the project. Executive Director Patzek is working with outside counsel, Shute, Mihaly & Weinberger LLP, to negotiate the terms of the funding agreement with Clover Flat Landfill, Inc.

The North Coast Soil Hub (https://soilhub.org/) is a collaborative initiative led by Resource Conservation Districts (RCDs) across Marin, Sonoma, Napa, Lake, Mendocino, and Humboldt Counties, with Napa RCD as a founding member. This regional coalition provides technical support, education, and resources to promote soil health and sustainable land management practices. Emilie Winfield will present updates on current initiatives, partnerships, and funding opportunities. She will also highlight future strategies and ways stakeholders can engage with the Hub's work to support resilient agricultural and natural ecosystems.

RE: Huichica Creek Measure AA Mitigation Funding

I. Issue

Assess whether mitigation funding may be used alongside Measure AA funding to support the Huichica Creek Riparian and Salt Marsh Restoration Project.

II. Brief Answer

We believe that the joint application of mitigation funding and Measure AA funding in this case would support the San Francisco Bay Restoration Authority's goals and policies because leveraging both sources of funding would allow Napa RCD to complete the Huichica Creek Riparian and Salt Marsh Restoration Project in full as proposed.

III. Background

Napa RCD applied to the San Francisco Bay Restoration Authority ("Authority") for Measure AA funding to support the Huichica Creek Riparian and Salt Marsh Restoration Project. This planning and design project focuses on habitat restoration on about 70 acres of the lower portion of Huichica Creek, as well as flood management and public access. The plan created by this project will outline restoration of 19 acres of tidal marsh habitat, 23 acres of estuarine habitat, and 28 acres of freshwater marsh and riparian habitat. The proposed project does not include acquisition. However, the planning process will include a real estate analysis to explore the opportunity to protect those areas of the marshland transition zone and lower creek corridor currently on private agricultural lands through either a conservation easement or fee simple purchase.

Napa RCD budgeted \$1,999,563 in its application to the Authority. The current plan is to fund approximately \$1 million through a Measure AA grant. The remaining balance will be covered by mitigation funding owed by Waste Connections based on its ownership and operation of Clover Flat Landfill. Waste Connections negotiated those mitigation funding obligations with the San Francisco Bay Regional Water Quality Control Board ("RWQCB") and the California Department of Fish and Wildlife ("CDFW"). RWQCB and CDFW specifically approved use of the mitigation funding for temporal impacts, meaning it can be allocated towards planning, permitting, and other non-construction activities. This aligns well with the proposed project, which is focused on restoration planning rather than implementation. Waste Connections' mitigation obligations do not track specific numeric outcomes (e.g., number of trees planted or acres restored).

IV. Assessment

Nothing in the Authority's authorizing legislation or Measure AA restricts the use of mitigation funding alongside Measure AA funds. However, the Authority typically prohibits the co-application of mitigation and Measure AA funds unless the grantee receives written approval to do so. The Authority's main concerns are twofold: (1) they want to ensure that they are not subsidizing mitigation that another entity is supposed to pay for, and (2) they want to ensure that grantees are not double-dipping for the same work. In other words, "the Authority's share of the funds must pay for an incremental improvement beyond compensation for damages that may have occurred elsewhere as part of the mitigation requirements." (Use of Mitigation Funds on Property Used for Authority Projects, Oct. 15, 2021, San Francisco Bay Restoration Authority, at 1-2.)

To address those concerns, the Authority usually includes boilerplate language in its grant agreements prohibiting the use of Measure AA projects for mitigation without written authorization from the Authority's Executive Officer. The Authority has published mitigation guidelines explaining how grantees may request that authorization. Those guidelines presume that the grant agreement is already in place and that it contains the prohibitory boilerplate.

Napa RCD has not yet entered into a grant agreement with the Authority for the Huichica Creek project. The Authority therefore has the option to authorize the use of mitigation funding in the grant agreement itself. The Authority does not publicize guidelines addressing how to seek approval at the time the grant is awarded. However, assuming the Authority's pre-grant analysis is similar to its post-grant analysis, Napa RCD has a strong case to support the concurrent use of mitigation funding for this project.



The following questions from the Authority's mitigation guidelines demonstrate why the joint application of mitigation funds and Measure AA funds is appropriate in these circumstances:

a. What is the benefit of the proposed mitigation to the real property or to the resources of the property? Is the benefit from the proposed mitigation quantifiable or measurable?

In this case the mitigation funding would supplement Measure AA funds and would together provide the full budget required to complete the project. The benefits of the mitigation are thus substantially the same as the benefits of the Measure AA-funded project. Napa RCD would likely not be able to complete the project as proposed without this additional funding.

b. Does the Authority's grant "subsidize" the mitigation in any manner? For an Authority-funded acquisition project, does the mitigation requirement include a fee for the use of the grantee's land in addition or as part of the mitigation requirement? For Authority-funded restoration projects, does the restoration already completed or anticipated on the property enable the mitigation (for example, if the Authority funded wetland restoration and the mitigation calls for the creation of habitat for a wetland species, will the mitigation fee take into account the already-funded wetland creation)?

We understand that RWQCB and CDFW have broadly approved the use of these mitigation funds for planning purposes. We also understand that Waste Connections' mitigation obligations are not tied to specific numeric outcomes. RWQCB has indicated that it will consider the mitigation successful when Waste Connections executes a contract for the delivery of funds to Napa RCD. The Authority's Measure AA grant could arguably "subsidize" the mitigation in the sense that the joint application of Measure AA funds with mitigation funds would allow Napa RCD to complete the project to the full extent proposed in Napa RCD's grant application. Without both sources of funding, Napa RCD would not have sufficient funds to cover the full project budget. However, the mitigation funding would "subsidize" the Measure AA-funded work in the same way.

The reciprocal benefits provided by leveraging both sources of funding mean that this project more closely resembles a public-private partnership than a standalone mitigation project. Given the unique nature of these mitigation funds and the fact that they may be applied towards planning, permitting, and other non-construction activities, the joint application of mitigation funding and Measure AA funding on this project should increase, rather than decrease the public benefit produced from both sources of funding.



c. Does the mitigation requirement advance or impede the Authority's programmatic goals for the property?

Without both sources of funding, Napa RCD would not have sufficient funds to cover the full project budget. The mitigation requirement should therefore advance the Authority's programmatic goals for the property by allowing Napa RCD to complete the project in full as proposed in its grant application.

d. Is the grantee capable institutionally (capacity plus actual experiencedriven application) to implement the mitigation requirement on the property? Alternatively, is the mitigator (the entity needing mitigation) or its contractor capable of implementing the mitigation requirement on the property?

Napa RCD has demonstrated its ability to carry out the Huichica Creek Riparian and Salt Marsh Restoration Project in its grant application.

e. What is the predicted success of the mitigation and who determines success (if a CEQA mitigation measure, the grantee should provide the mitigation reporting document which identifies a public agency responsible for ensuring the implementation and success of the mitigation measure).

The mitigation is expected to be successful because, by combining mitigation funds with Measure AA funds, Napa RCD will have the full budget required to complete the project as proposed. To evaluate and report on the project's effectiveness, the project team will first observe, record, and report on the findings of existing data and data gaps. This includes vegetation conditions, current land use, recreation and public access, the permitting process and agency engagement, hydrology, geomorphology and ecological function, historical land use, water use, flooding issues, hydraulic modeling documentation, and road access/bridge crossing (including an alternative Duhig Rd crossing). These observations will inform the restoration design by identifying opportunities and constraints. The team will also collect baseline data through UAV aerial imagery, establish photo stations, install stream gages and water quality monitoring sensors, conduct fish surveys, and conduct technical studies for CEQA documentation. The Habitat Restoration Plan developed during the planning phase, informed by data collected and collaboration with project partners and the TCWG, will provide the necessary information for habitat restoration. This plan will include monitoring protocol and strategies for the long-term protection and maintenance of the restored ecosystem. Huichica Creek will be assessed regularly through stream gage and water quality monitoring data with wildlife camera data collected monthly. Quarterly progress reports and a final report will discuss project effectiveness and lessons learned.

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As the answers above demonstrate, the Authority's share of funds for the Huichica Creek project would "pay for an incremental improvement beyond compensation for damages that may have occurred elsewhere as part of [Waste Connections'] mitigation requirements." (Use of Mitigation Funds on Property Used for Authority Projects, Oct. 15, 2021, San Francisco Bay Restoration Authority, at 1-2.) Napa RCD would not be able to fund the full project as proposed without both sources of funding. While either source of funding could potentially support a smaller project, leveraging both sources of funding together would create efficiencies and should allow Napa RCD to create a more impactful and coherent restoration plan. For that reason we believe there is a strong case that the joint application of mitigation funds and Measure AA funds to the Huichica Creek project would be consistent with the Authority's goals and policies.

AGREEMENT TO FUND A PORTION OF THE HUICHICA CREEK RIPARIAN AND SALT MARSH RESTORATION PROJECT

This Agreement is entered into by and between CLOVER FLAT LAND FILL, INC., a California corporation ("Clover Flat") and NAPA COUNTY RESOURCE CONSERVATION DISTRICT, a special District of the State of California (the "District") as of _______, 2025, (the "Effective Date"). The District and Clover Flat are sometimes referred to as "Parties" and may be individually referred to as "Party."

RECITALS

WHEREAS, Clover Flat intends to mitigate impacts at Clover Flat Landfill in Napa County, California, more commonly known as Assessor Parcel Number XXX-XXX, pursuant to that Napa District use permit (XXXXXX) ("Clover Flat Property")

WHEREAS, to mitigate for impacts to an unnamed drainage at the Clover Flat Landfill a Section 401 Water Quality Certification ("Certification") from the SF Bay Regional Water Quality Control Board ("RWQCB") and a Lake Streambed Alteration Agreement ("LSAA") form the California Department of Fish and Wildlife ("CDFW");

WHEREAS, the Certification and LSAA requires Clover Flat to mitigate for the impacts to the unnamed drainage, which lies within the Napa River Watershed;

WHEREAS, the District will undertake the Huichica Creek Riparian and Salt Marsh Restoration Project, a restoration project with high aquatic and biological resource conservation values, within the Napa River Watershed ("**Project**");

WHEREAS, Clover Flat, the RWQCB and CDFW have agreed that the Certification and LSAA's mitigation requirements can be satisfied by Clover Flat providing funds to the District for the purpose of supporting the Project; and

WHEREAS, the District desires to accept Clover Flat's contribution to a portion of the funding required for implementation of the Project, through a one-time payment to the District.

TERMS

NOW, THEREFORE, for valuable consideration, the Parties agree as follows:

- 1. Funding. Clover Flat shall pay Nine Hundred Fifty-Four Thousand Dollars (\$954,000.00) to the District for the sole purpose of funding the activities in support of the Project as described and depicted in **Exhibit A** ("**Project Description**") attached hereto and incorporated by this reference.
- <u>2.</u> <u>Payment Date</u>. Clover Flat shall pay the funding payment in full to the District no later than thirty (30) days after the Effective Date ("**Payment Date**").
- 3. <u>Permitting and Environmental Review</u>. The District shall be responsible for obtaining all permits and performing the required environmental review for the Project.

- <u>4.</u> <u>Mitigation and Monitoring Reports</u>. The District shall submit, or direct a third party to submit, a Mitigation and Monitoring report documenting the progress of the Project to the RWQCB by March 31st every year, as described in regulatory permits issued for the Project following the District's implementation of the Project for the first five years.
- 5. Obligations to Run with the Land. All rights, privileges, duties, and obligations of Clover Flat under this Agreement shall inure to and shall benefit and burden Clover Flat's successors and assigns to the ownership of the Clover Flat Property.
- <u>6.</u> <u>Indemnity</u>. The Parties shall indemnify and hold the other harmless from and against any and all claims, losses, costs, damages, expenses, liabilities, liens, actions, and causes of actions, including reasonable attorney's fees and costs, ("claims") asserted against or incurred by either party (an "Indemnified Party") from any cause arising out of or relating directly or indirectly to the performance or breach of this Agreement by the other party (or its agents, contractors, officers, or employees), other than claims caused by the negligence or willful misconduct of Indemnified Party.
- 7. <u>Enforcement.</u> If any Party commences an action against the other Party arising out of or in connection with this Agreement, the prevailing Party shall be entitled to recover their reasonable attorney's fees and costs of suit from the losing Party.
- <u>8.</u> <u>Further Assurances</u>. Each Party shall take all actions that may be necessary or proper to achieve the purposes and objectives of this Agreement.
- 9. <u>Complete Agreement; Amendments</u>. This is the complete and final Agreement between the Parties and supersedes all prior written or oral agreements between the Parties with respect to the subject matter hereof. Any amendments to this Agreement shall be in writing and signed by the Parties.
- 10. Relationship of Parties. Neither Party is acting as the agent of the other in any respect hereunder and each Party is an independent contracting entity with respect to the terms, covenants, and conditions contained in this Agreement. None of the terms or provisions of this Agreement shall be deemed to create a partnership or joint venture between the Parties.
- 11. Counterparts. This Agreement may be executed and delivered in any number of counterparts, each of which so executed and delivered shall be deemed to be an original and all of which shall constitute one and the same instrument.

Exhibit A

Project Description

Purpose of Funds: Funds under the Agreement will be applied to the Huichica Creek Riparian and Salt Marsh Restoration Project (Project), as shown on the attached Figure A-1. Construction is scheduled for implementation beginning in XXXX.

Description: The Napa River is one of the few large watersheds in the San Francisco Bay Area which has not been significantly urbanized and supports a wide range of wildlife and habitats. Prior to agriculture and development in the Napa Valley, the Napa River, its floodplain, and riparian corridor supported extensive forest and wetland habitats. Much of this habitat has been reduced over time. Prior to development, the Napa River was a broad, shallow river system with multiple channels. The Napa River is now generally confined to a single channel that is deeply incised by 12-15 ft. in some reaches. Much of the river corridor is bound by flood berms at the top of the river banks to protect neighboring properties from flooding. This confinement keeps the channel zone fairly homogenous in terms of instream complexity features, such as bars, benches, pools, alcoves, etc. This lack of geomorphic complexity results in a less diverse riparian community and reduced quality and quantity of instream habitat for native aquatic species, such as Chinook salmon, steelhead, and California freshwater shrimp. The constricted channel condition has resulted in bank erosion and slumping in several locations resulting in the loss of valuable riparian habitat and vineyard land and infrastructure.

The Project has several design elements that are intended to restore physical and biological processes to the Napa River, including channel widening, floodplain and wetland restoration, biotechnical stabilization, instream habitat structures, managed retreat, and native vegetation enhancement. The overall objective of the Project is to implement the adopted Napa River Sediment TMDL by reducing fine sediment and polluted runoff within the Napa River watershed and to restore habitat and beneficial uses, including spawning and rearing habitat for Chinook salmon and steelhead trout.

Design plans for the Project include the following restoration outputs.

- XX acres total of riparian expansion, restoration and revegetation
- X acres of frequently activated new floodplain and off channel alcove areas
- XXX linear feet of secondary and high flow channel
- XXXX linear feet of actively stabilized banks
- X acres of freshwater wetland enhancement and expansion

Monitoring and Maintenance:

The District will be responsible for the long-term monitoring and maintenance of the Project. The *Huichica Creek Riparian and Salt Marsh Restoration Project Monitoring Plan* describes the monitoring protocols and frequency of monitoring and maintenance surveys that will be used to evaluate and report on the Project's effectiveness. Monitoring will include Cross Section Transect Surveys, Habitat Assessment, and Vegetation Surveys. Additionally, a maintenance program has been developed to guide adaptive management needs for installed and created restoration features within the project reach. Monitoring results will be reported to the RWQCB, along with other project stakeholders, as part of the annual monitoring report by March 31 each year.

RESOLUTION NO. 2025-02

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE NAPA COUNTY RESOURCE CONSERVATION DISTRICT IN SUPPORT OF H.RES.1563 AND ITS REINTRODUCTION INTO THE 119TH CONGRESS

WHEREAS, the Napa County Resource Conservation District ("District") is an independent special district of the State of California that empowers the Napa County community to voluntarily conserve, protect, and restore natural resources in a landscape that supports agriculture, urban areas, and wildlands through the provision of technical assistance, educational programs, monitoring initiatives, and funding opportunities; and

WHEREAS, the District adopted a five-year strategic plan outlining a programmatic vision to enhance climate resilience and ensure the well-being of future generations; and

WHEREAS, on August 11, 2022, the District adopted Resolution No. 2022-03, recognizing a climate emergency and committing to specific actions and responsibilities; and

WHEREAS, Congressman Mike Thompson introduced H.Res.1563 on November 5, 2024, reflecting the nation's commitment to ensuring a safe and healthy climate for future generations by striving for climate restoration, specifically aiming to reduce atmospheric CO₂ concentrations below 300 ppm by 2050—a level under which humans have primarily lived; and

WHEREAS, in Resolution No. 2022-03, the District acknowledged the following:

- Climate modeling indicates that stabilizing global mean temperature rise at or below 1.5°C is not feasible through emissions reduction alone;
- Napa County, its residents, economy, and environment have already experienced severe
 adverse effects of climate change, including prolonged and intensified wildfire seasons,
 firestorms, rising temperatures, rising sea levels, mudslides, severe droughts, damage to
 local agriculture, property destruction, and infrastructure deterioration;
- Climate change represents a global catastrophic risk to human health, safety, and economic prosperity, as well as a grave threat to ecosystem health, structure, and function;
- The District's Strategic Plan commits it to partnering with organizations at the local, regional, and state levels to address critical natural resource challenges, including climate change; and

WHEREAS, Resolution No. 2022-03 further states that:

• The District supports the Napa County Board of Supervisors' goal of achieving net-zero



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- greenhouse gas emissions by or before 2030 as a crucial step toward maintaining the health and wellness of humans and ecosystems;
- The District encourages individuals and organizations within Napa County working toward the 2030 climate goals to engage with the District for support and collaboration; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Directors of the Napa County Resource Conservation District hereby:

- 1. Endorses Representative Thompson's Congressional Climate Restoration Resolution, H.Res.1563, and urges its reintroduction in the 119th Congress.
- 2. Calls upon Napa County, its cities and towns, and the California Association of Resource Conservation Districts to endorse H.Res.1563 and take action to restore the climate by stabilizing greenhouse gas concentrations at preindustrial levels.

Project Tasks
