Drip irrigated 3-4 times per week in summer in 2 cycles from 5-10 min each depending on heat

<p><u>Arctostaphylos stanfordiana var. bakeri 'Louis Edmunds'</u></p>		<p>Native. Planted Sep. 2016</p> <p>Selected for purple bark and smaller size (6-8'). First to bloom in late January. Not on irrigation.</p>
<p><u>Ceanothus 'Concha'</u></p>		<p>Native. Planted Fall 2020</p> <p>Selected for dark purple flowers. Blooms in February. Not on irrigation.</p>
<p><u>Salvia apiana 'White Sage'</u></p>		<p>Native. Planted late Summer 2016</p> <p>Self sows, but not prolific. Not on irrigation.</p>






Spring Annuals (pulled out after flowering, around June)






<p><u>Clarkia purpurea</u> 'Wine Cup'</p>		<p>Native, self sows</p> <p>Host plant for the white-lined sphinx moth caterpillar</p>
<p><u>Consolida ajacis</u> 'Larkspur' 'Earl Grey' and 'Blue Spire'</p>		<p>Non-native, self sows</p>
<p><u>Diplacus pictus</u> 'Calico Monkeyflower'</p>		<p>Native, self sows</p>
<p><u>Nemophila maculata</u> 'Five Spot'</p>		<p>Native, self sows</p>
<p><u>Nemophila menziesii</u> 'Penny Black'</p>		<p>Native cultivar, self sows</p>






<p>Papaver hybridum 'Sugar Plum'</p>		<p>Non-native. Self sowing, biennial.</p>
<p>Phacelia ciliata</p>		<p>Native, self sows</p>

Perennials

<p>Achillea millefolium 'Cameo'</p>		<p>Non-native, moderate summer water to look best.</p>
<p>Calendula officinalis</p>		<p>Non-native, drought tolerant. Perennial in my yard. Self sows.</p>
<p>Chrysanthemum x morifolium 'Belgian Mum'</p>		<p>Non-native. No pinching needed Doesn't require much water to look good. Surprisingly heat tolerant for this hottest part of the yard.</p>






<p>Dahlia 'Dracula'</p>		<p>Non-native. Needs moderate water to flower. Selected for dark purple foliage and the name, of course.</p>
<p>Datura metel 'Belle Blanche'</p>		<p>Non-native, drought tolerant, self sows</p>
<p>Echeveria harmsii 'Ruby Slipper'</p>		<p>Non-native, drought tolerant succulent</p>
<p>Echeveria Renee O'Connell hybrid 'Camaleon'</p>		<p>Non-native, drought tolerant succulent</p>
<p>Erigeron glaucus 'Wayne Roderick' aka Seaside Daisy</p>		<p>Native</p>

<p><u>Eschscholzia californica 'Apricot Chiffon'</u></p>		<p>Native cultivar, does not reseed true to parent</p>
<p><u>Eschscholzia californica 'Thai Silk'</u></p>		<p>Native cultivar, does not reseed true to parent</p>
<p><u>Geranium harveyi 'Silver Geranium'</u></p>		<p>Non-native, drought tolerant groundcover. Self sows.</p>
<p>Graptosedum 'Ghosty'</p>		<p>Non-native, drought tolerant succulent</p>
<p>Hylotelephium telephium 'Autumn Joy' (formerly Sedum)</p>		<p>Non-native, drought tolerant succulent</p>

<p>Lavandula angustifolia 'Hidcote'</p>		<p>Non-native, drought tolerant Planted at the same time as Munstead. About twice as big.</p>
<p>Lavandula angustifolia 'Munstead'</p>		<p>Non-native, drought tolerant Smaller and airier than Hidcote</p>
<p>Lupinus sericatus 'Cobb Mountain Lupine'</p>		<p>Napa County Native. Self sows</p>
<p>Mimulus bifidus 'White'</p>		<p>Native, drought tolerant. Touchy about over watering and good drainage. Self sows occasionally</p>
<p>Osteospermum 'African Daisy'</p>		<p>Non-native, drought tolerant. Spreads over time.</p>

<p><u>Papaver atlanticum 'Moroccan Poppy'</u></p>		<p>Non-native, drought tolerant. Self sows prolifically.</p>
<p><u>Penstemon heterophyllus 'Foothill Penstemon'</u></p>		<p>Native. Self sows</p>
<p><u>Penstemon heterophyllus 'Margarita BOP'</u></p>		<p>Native. Spreads to form a groundcover.</p>
<p>Salvia 'Amistad'</p>		<p>Non-native, low water use. Successfully propagated via cutting.</p>
<p>Salvia greggi 'Blue Note' aka Autumn Sage</p>		<p>Non-native, drought tolerant. Spreads once established.</p>




<p>Salvia x jamensis 'Opaline'</p>		<p>Non-native, drought tolerant. Pollinator favorite.</p>
<p>Salvia 'Mystic Spires'</p>		<p>Non-native. Needs water to flower well. Cut back twice a year. Flowers nearly all year long.</p>
<p>Salvia sclarea 'Piemont'</p>		<p>Non-native. Needs water. Snails love it. Cut back after flowering once summer heat hits. Self sows.</p>
<p>Scabiosa atropurpurea 'Black Knight'</p>		<p>Non-Native. Needs water. Propagates from seed.</p>
<p>Scutellaria californica 'California Skullcap'</p>		<p>Native</p>



<p>Sedum Sunsparkler 'Dazzleberry'</p>		<p>Non-native succulent. Needs water in the hottest part of summer (or else more shade).</p>
<p>Sisyrinchium bellum 'North Coast' aka Blue Eyed Grass</p>		<p>Native</p>
<p>Teucrium cossonii 'Majoricum'</p>		<p>Non-native, drought tolerant ground cover. Bees love it.</p>
<p>Trachelium caeruleum 'Hamer Pandora'</p>		<p>Non-native, needs summer water. Self sows occasionally. Selected for purple foliage and summer flowers</p>
<p>Verbena bonariensis</p>		<p>Non-native, drought tolerant, self sows exuberantly</p>

No drip irrigation. Hand water once a month in summer.




<p>Frangula californica ‘Coffeeberry’</p>		<p>Native. Planted Fall 2020</p>
<p>Heteromeles arbutifolia ‘Toyon’</p>		<p>Native. Planted Fall 2020</p>
<p>Parrotia persica ‘Persian Ironwood’</p>		<p>Non-native. Planted Fall 2020</p> <p>Watered weekly in summer for first 2 years, monthly now.</p> <p>Selected for fall color and smaller height. It is not what I expected it to look like - I think the varietal was mislabeled.</p>




<p>Salvia apiana</p>		<p>Native. Planted Fall 2020</p>
<p>Salvia brandegeei 'Santa Rosa Island Sage'</p>		<p>Native. Planted 2013.</p>






Spring Annuals (plants pulled out after flowering, around June)


<p>Clarkia purpurea 'Wine Cup'</p>		<p>Native, self sows First Clarkia to bloom.</p>
<p>Clarkia rubicunda 'Ruby Chalice'</p>		<p>Native, self sows</p>
<p>Clarkia rubicunda 'Shamini'</p>		<p>Native, self sows Taller and later blooming than 'Ruby Chalice'</p>



<p>Clarkia unguiculata 'Elegant Clarkia'</p>		<p>Native, self sows</p>
<p>Layia platyglossa 'Tidy Tips'</p>		<p>Native, self sows</p> <p>2026 most of crop got eaten by something and the rest died back from lack of sun. The garden has filled in!</p>

Perennials

<p>Achillea millefolium 'Sonoma Coast'</p>		<p>Native</p> <p>Dies back in summer - wants more water than I give this side of the yard. But some sprigs always return the following spring.</p>
<p>Arctostaphylos 'Emerald Carpet'</p>		<p>Hybridized native. Drought tolerant ground cover. Lovely green carpet in the heat of summer.</p>
<p>Aristolochia californica 'Dutchmans Pipevine'</p>		<p>Native.</p> <p>Multiple attempts to grow this and it just doesn't do much. I'm hoping under the coffeeberry is the right spot this time.</p>

<p><u>Asclepias fascicularis 'Narrow Leaf Milkweed'</u></p>		<p>Native</p> <p>Asclepias californica nearly took over our front yard and we still didn't attract monarchs. It broke my heart to remove it, but it was crowding out everything. Now I'm trying this smaller version that hopefully has more self control.</p>
<p><u>Diplacus aurantiacus 'Sticky Monkey Flower'</u></p>		<p>Native. Self sows occasionally.</p> <p>Touchy about over watering and good drainage. Doesn't like the clay/rocky areas of this part of the yard.</p>
<p><u>Epilobium canum 'California Fuschia'</u></p>		<p>Native. Spreads by rhizome once established. Fall flowers.</p> <p>I can't stop it from intertwining with Eriogonum fasciculatum. The two are fast friends. Actually, it wants to be friends with everyone in the yard now.</p>
<p><u>Eriogonum fasciculatum</u></p>		<p>Native. Spreads to form 1' tall groundcover over time.</p> <p>Flowers turn a pretty rust color in the fall. Interesting butterflies and orange wasps love it. Successfully propagated via cuttings.</p>
<p><u>Eriogonum grande var rubescens 'Red Flowered Buckwheat'</u></p>		<p>Native. Occasionally self sows.</p>

<p><u>Eriogonum umbellatum 'Sulphur Buckwheat'</u></p>		<p>Native.</p> <p>Successfully propagated via cuttings.</p>
<p><u>Eschscholzia californica</u></p>		<p>Native. Many color variations throughout the yard.</p>
<p><u>Lewisia longipetala 'Little Raspberry'</u></p>		<p>Native. Likes this shadier spot.</p>
<p><u>Pelargonium sidoides 'South African Geranium'</u></p>		<p>Non-native, drought tolerant. Spreads into a tidy ground cover.</p>
<p><u>Penstemon heterophyllus 'Foothill or Blue Springs'</u></p>		<p>Native. Self sows. More compact than Margarita BOP with electric blue/purple color.</p>

<p><u>Penstemon heterophyllus</u> <u>'Margarita BOP'</u></p>		<p>Native. Spreads to form a groundcover.</p>
<p><u>Solanum ubelliferum</u> 'Bluewitch <u>Nightshade</u>'</p>		<p>Native. Good in clay or rocky soil. Wants to spread.</p>
